Members of the Brownsville Kiwanis club today doff their adult worries and revert to the times of their boyhood as they become newsboys for a day.

In connection with National Kids' Day, which will be celebrated Saturday, club members will sell copies of *The Brownsville Herald*. The proceeds they raise will be used to build a regulation Little League Ball Park in Fort Brown. The Kiwanis club originated the Little League program in Brownsville this year and sponsored a team.

Additional money will go to Brownsville's underprivileged children. During recent years the Kiwanis club has equipped and lighted playgrounds at Fourth Ward and Calhoun schools and contributed in many other ways to easing for underprivileged children of Brownsville.

National Kids' Day will be celebrated by Kiwanis clubs throughout the nation Saturday. J. C. Yancy, president of the local group, said today the annual observance is sponsored by Kiwanis International and the National Kids' Day Foundation of North Hollywood, Calif.

Use Of Federal Funds Will Not Affect Harlingen Clinic

AUSTIN—A spokesman for the state hospital board here said Wednesday that although the state health board has recommended that federal funds be allocated only to the San Antonio tuberculosis hospital, the hospital there will not necessarily be constructed before the one in Harlingen.

Larry Cox, director of the state board for hospitals and special schools, said a request for funds for both the Harlingen and San Antonio tuberculosis units will be made at a meeting of the state health board in November.

The health board, which administers Hill-Burton federal hospital aid funds in Texas, has recommended that \$1,325,000 in federal funds, half the anticipated cost of the hospital, be allocated to the San Antonio unit.

"This does not mean the San Antonio hospital will be constructed before one is built in Harlingen."
